Half-Way Through

I've been reflecting on how, (as of the date of this article), we are now half-way through our Lenten journey. I've also been reflecting on how I often feel like I am half-way through many things, many periods of life, and many decisions, as well. This has further invited me to honestly acknowledge that when I am only "half-way through" something, I am often left feeling frustrated, impatient, and sometimes, even anxious.

Some of you are "half-way" through many things: medical treatments, important family decisions, stressful financial decisions, and so on. Amen." (Ephesians 3:20-21) That scripture grounds me in the fact that indeed God can do "far more than all we can ask or imagine!" God IS at work in our lives individually, as a congregation, as families and as people who care deeply for our country and for the whole world. We are not alone. We have a God who is at work behind the scenes and along with us, using us to do God's work here and in the world. We may be "half -way" through our journey but we are not alone and God is not done doing God's work through us, and for us.

The hope of the cross reminds us that Jesus' work was complete. The hope of the tomb tells us that God is a God of impossibilities, of new hope, and new beginnings!

A friend told me about an unusual Easter card available at Walmart, Target or supermarkets. It almost looks like a Christmas card because the upper half of the card features a nativity scene with a baby in a manger, surrounded by adoring shepherds. Mary sits by the manger, gazing upon the child, while Joseph hovers nearby. The wise men are in the distance, approaching the stable. But the shepherds take up most of the space, and it is the shepherds one notices first.

The lower half of the card features those same shepherds, 30 years later, standing before Jesus' empty tomb.

I wonder what they were thinking.

Perhaps they were thinking about the love of God.

Thirty years earlier, the birth at Bethlehem demonstrated God's love in a way that was creative, powerful and almost unthinkable! God became a human being! The Bible even makes an explicit link between the birth of Jesus and the vast love of God: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son ..." (John 3:16).

But as the shepherds stood before the empty tomb they also got a lesson in the love of God. The Bible very plainly links the Cross to God's love for us: "But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

Ever wonder which revelation of God was greater news to tell? Was it the birth of God's love, or the triumph of God's love over sin, death and the devil?

It takes childlike trust in God's love and assurance to have faith in these two visions of love incarnate.

JUSTATHOUGHT

Familiarity breeds contempt. This quote was first attributed to Publilius, a writer living in ancient Rome. One thousand years later, Pope Innocent III used it. You may have read it in one of Geoffrey Chaucer's stories. Or if you preferred Mark Twain, you may have come across his enhanced version: Familiarity breeds contempt - and children. Since then, famous persons all over the world have expressed their own opinions on the subject. However, while many of these statements are very humorous, original and interesting, it seems that their authors were satisfied with first impressions. – Googling the quote will produce a great variety of opinions on the subject. – If we were to assume that the word familiarity does nothing else but breed contempt, then we should strike it from our vocabulary as being entirely useless in its negativity. But first we need to know all the facts about this perfectly nice-sounding word. So, let's ask the question: "Are there other meanings implied by the word familiarity?" A search through various English dictionaries produced more confusion than enlightenment. The meanings ranged from the very positive to the very negative. Positive were friendship, fellowship, feeling of ease and trust; negative were disrespect, rudeness, contempt. We know that it shares its root, the Latin word familia, with our English word family. How, then, could we accept that familiarity is only breeding contempt? Let's look at the smallest unit of a family consisting of father, mother, and at least one child. Rearing a child means getting to know the individual intimately; very little is hidden from the observant care-giver, and as the infant's brain develops, the child watches Mom and Dad very closely. Love and trust are built by such intimate contact. The siblings in a family may not always exhibit those beautiful traits. They do not hesitate to criticize their brothers' and sisters' shortcomings. "You always pick your nose." "You always dribble the soup down your front." But when the family unit is threatened by outside forces, the ranks are closed; forgotten are all squabbles; the protection of the family and all its members is the only thing of importance. The sincere concern for the safety of the entire group, the family, overrides all minor disagreements. Looking beyond the single family unit, we find that the forces at work in building love, respect and trust in the family are the same forces needed to transform groups of superficially connected strangers into communities of friends. Whether they are religious congregations, neighbors in communities, or people living on the same floor of a tall apartment building in a metropolitan area, they are all humans who need the feeling of belonging, the comforting assurance of being important to those around them. This sense of being part of a group develops as strangers become acquainted and find common interests. It is this kind of familiarity that creates mutual respect and trust, the glue that bonds groups together for action as a unit. If, on the other hand, many people were to believe that familiarity breeds contempt, life in this world could be unpleasant. Instead of true friendship, there might be only superficial contact between human beings. This kind of self-imposed isolation would be especially harmful in times of illness, of need for emotional support, when only a true friend feels committed to help. There would also be fewer projects done for the common good because of the isolationist's lack of concern for the greater community. How can this be prevented? It seems there is only one way to make life on this earth a good experience for everybody. All believers in the good effect of familiarity, its breeding of respect, friendship and trust, must use their best efforts to foster ever more communities of true friendship and respect until they encompass the entire world.

From Easter Ideals edited by Van B. Hooper we have the history of Easter in Many Lands:

"Easter is one of the most joyously celebrated religious days of the year. Beyond the deep religious observations, the Spring Festival has taken on many forms in different countries, including different customs over the ages.

The name Easter derives from Eostre, an ancient Teutonic Goddess of Spring. In other countries, like France, Easter is called 'Paques' derived from 'pasch,' meaning literally 'he passes over,' and alludes to the Jewish Passover.

As Christmas has been identified with the winter solstice during the early developing years of the early church—so Easter was celebrated in the spring in recognition of rebirth of nature.

The Council of Christian Churches in 325 decided that Easter should be on the first Sunday following the Paschal Full Moon. The pilgrims making their way to the yearly Easter festival needed the light of the full moon to aid in their travels—which was the principal reason for so establishing the date of Easter.

The identifying of the egg with Easter has been observed in many countries throughout the world since ancient times.

Symbolically, the egg has been used in ancient Easter rites to represent the Spring season. Just when this originated is unknown—but the egg represents the revival of the fertility of the earth and is a symbol of the secret of life—and was so considered a fitting emblem for the spring season.

It is explained that the longing for the colorful flowers of spring following the long cold winter was the motivating force behind the custom of coloring Easter eggs in beautiful gay colors.

The symbolic Easter egg has been utilized in many ways—from egg racing (Switzerland)—egg 'nicking' (The Netherlands) an Easter Parade (France), an exploding Judas filled with 30 pieces of silver (Mexico), and many others.

The most elaborate custom involving the Easter egg was developed in Russia. For many years exquisitely decorated eggs were given by them as presents. In the late nineteenth century this practice changed from real eggs to delicately made eggs of great value—many were made of pure gold with precious jewels and enamels decorating them.

The beloved Easter Bunny is of German origin. His association with Easter stems from the fact that he is a symbol of prolific reproduction of life—and not that he is supposed to lay eggs.

There are many customs in many lands—but whatever the custom and whatever the date—the one time meaning of Easter is the Risen Christ. Its deep religious significance transcends eggs, rabbits, flowers, fashions and customs, even as the sun transcends the little incidentals of our man-made ways."

My favorite Easter custom is the Easter-egg hunt, and our family has always encouraged the adults and children to decide if they want to be "hunters" or "hiders." The Easter egg hunt began with Martin Luther who equated the egg hunt with the women hunting for Jesus, after His Resurrection.




SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS
