Scripture Reading: Acts 9:36-43

Kindness in words creates confidence; kindness in thinking creates profoundness; kindness in giving creates love. —Anon.

Here's a story of what can happen when your heart and eyes are open to feel and to see the need around you.

When Krista transitioned from a shelter for battered women into her new home, she was so thrilled just to have a safe place for her two children to sleep.

But when she showed off her new home to her friend, Treger Strasberg, there was no furniture or beds. Strasberg was crushed at the sight of Krista's children making nests out of their old coats on the floor to sleep on. She knew her own closets were overflowing and that her garage had furniture she wasn't using.

She also knew that her friends had similar items to donate.

Determined to help her friend, Strasberg rounded up donations of gently used furniture, kitchen utensils and even pictures for the walls. And thus was born Humble Design, a non-profit committed to *turning houses into homes*. Families moving into new houses share their dreams for their new homes, and Humble Design springs to action by assessing the rooms of the house and then pulling items from their large warehouse. While the family is away for the day, a truck loaded with household goods arrives at the location where a crew of volunteers are on hand to make the house a home.

Since that day in Detroit in 2009, over 1,100 families have been served, and Humble Design, a nonprofit organization, has opened in three additional cities: Chicago, Seattle and San Diego. Corporate sponsors like U-Haul have jumped in to help. They have also developed a weekly TV show sharing their vision of empathy with the world.

"Our goal," says Strasberg, "is to give dignity and hope to every family who has suffered homelessness."

This is a wonderful story. And stories like this happen on a smaller scale every day when our hearts are moved by someone's need. The smallest gesture, the softest word, the simplest act of kindness can make a world of difference.

They call it "Our Village." Where is this village? It can be found in any large city, anywhere in the world. It may be a complex of buildings housing up to several hundred senior citizens in small apartments. Often such places are described as Retirement Living. Trees provide shade for the grounds; everywhere, hedges and bands of lawn invite residents to set up a few chairs and small tables for a pleasant hour's chat with neighbors. Dates are made for shopping trips or doctor's appointments. There are picnic areas where special days are celebrated with hot dogs, salads, dips and crackers, as well as cakes. Everybody contributes something to make these events very special. These are, indeed, friendly places where neighbors love neighbors.

A large real estate investment corporation, the Wiseguys, has recently acquired another one of these projects. With some improvements and adjustments, it promises to become a very profitable source of income. There will have to be a different type of management. The manager living on-site will be replaced. The corporation has engaged the services of a man with a strong will who is not unduly hampered by kind feelings. His name is Mr. Krass. They have also found an assistant for him, Kid Klooless. At Kid's first interview he is told that major changes are needed at the new project, to which he answers immediately: "What's wrong? I know this place, it looks perfectly good to me." "That's precisely what's wrong with it," is the answer. "With proper training you will be the perfect gopher. Remember, when making a promise to a resident, you must always open your sentence with the same word: eventually. Eventually is the most important word because nobody can accuse you of lying. Eventually, you will have a good job here."

"Did you see our new manager this morning? He does not look friendly." The residents are very uneasy; they do not feel like chatting. One after the other leaves; apartment doors close. A thunderstorm is brewing. After the heavy downpour has stopped, the residents see their chairs and tables crushed to bits, nothing but junk to be loaded by ruthless men onto trucks and brought to the dump. Gone with them is their happiness, their community. What will be next? They do not have to wait long. One morning, Maria knocks on her neighbor's door. She is in tears: "Joe, did you see what they did? Our tomato plants in the containers on the patio, ripped out. And the ripe tomatoes crushed on the ground. They wouldn't even let us have those!" When Kid hears their complaints, he smiles and says: "Don't worry, eventually we will set up a plot with beautiful raised beds, so you can do your gardening without bending over."

Another morning dawns in the village. Slowly, a door opens. "Oh, how beautiful! Thank you, Lord." Another door creaks open, "What is it, Jenny?" "Look at the sunrise, Ruth; those beautiful colors. I could cry." More neighbors step outside; it is the same crowd that used to be so happy together. Eyes make contact, looking deeply into the souls of old friends: "Why did we hide behind locked doors? Why did we let this happen? How could we allow strangers to destroy our community?" An unspoken vow is made right then and there: "No matter what it may take, we will again build the loving community of concerned friends we once enjoyed. We will stand up and proclaim that love and respect for all living beings are still practiced in this world. We will invite all people to join with us to make this earth a better place once more." Maria tries a little smile: "Friends, let's keep this promise in our hearts: We will be happy again some day."

MOTHER'S DAY IS COMING: Devotions for Moms by *Ellen Banks Elwell* "Be strong and courageous! Don't be afraid of the King of Assyria or his mighty army, for there is a power far greater on our side! *2 Chronicles 32:7*

1)Ellen says: When my son Chad was about five or six, his nighttime slumber was sometimes interrupted by bad dreams. On those nights, I'd wake up to hear him crying for me or my husband. I'd shuffle through the hallway to Chad's room and sit on the edge of his bed.

First, I would listen to his fears, and then I told him I had fears myself. "When I'm afraid," I said, "I talk to God. God sees everything, knows everything, and can do anything. God is strong and God can help us."

After we talked for awhile, I encouraged Chad to memorize the beginning of Philippians 4:6-7 --"Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything." We also talked about Moses (crossing the Red Sea) and David (fighting Goliath); they had fears too, but God was faithful to give them help and courage.

Whenever our children have fearful experiences of any kind, it's important for them to know that we care about them, are willing to help them, and will always point them to God. Then they have opportunities to grow in faith and courage too.

2)Guide my steps by your word, so I will not be overcome by evil. Psalm 119:133

A young man who hoped to be chosen as a steamboat pilot on the Mississippi River was nearing the end of his job interview. The interviewer, curious to discover if the young man was aware of the dangers of the river, asked if he knew where all the rocks were. The young man wisely responded, "No sir, I do not know where all the rocks are, but I know where they *aren't*. He got the job.

As Moms, we need help navigating the river of motherhood. Although, each of our routes is slightly different, wisdom to know where the rocks aren't is available to us all. It's available in the form of words—God's words. "For the Lord grants wisdom, His every word is a treasure of knowledge and understanding." (*Proverbs 2:6, TLB*) God's words give us discernment for what is true, right and lasting. God's words are more valuable than gold or silver. We need to hear God's words every day of our motherhood—even after our kids have left home!


