

JUSTATHOUGHT

Observing our younger generations, we find that many of them have trained themselves to focus their mental capacities on a very narrow field of interest. The lure of that small flat box, the cell phone, has produced a new type of addiction that has even trapped some of the older folks. It is the need for mental stimulation by looking for hours at a high-tech device. Unfortunately, this new kind of "entertainment" has led to the social isolation of young people who no longer want to be part of the crowd; the crowd that taught our youth proper social behavior not too many years ago. This single-mindedness has produced an unbalanced state that is unhealthy for the human body. Admittedly, a disciplined narrow focus, used for the right purpose, has produced excellent engineers and inventors who have moved us far into the Age of Technology. But it has also damaged the social fabric of our society. Depression and suicidal thoughts have increased at an alarming rate. How can we reestablish the balance essential for a healthful life?

Human beings were never meant to live in isolation. Our communities, towns as well as cities, are proof that we thrive in cooperation with others, where we pool our varied talents to create a better life for all. Communication produces a type of overall balance. But this depends on the inner, individual balance of each member of the community. How did we lose this balance? How can we find it again? For centuries, the well-educated person had to have studied the humanities as well as science, as much as was known of the latter at the time. The humanities include several branches: art, music, architecture, philosophy and literature. These studies are now offered as liberal arts at universities, leading to the BA or bachelor of arts. The study of sciences, or mathematics leads to the BS or bachelor of science. In modern times, the BS degree has been considered superior to the BA degree. Some people even thought that liberal arts studies were for the student who was not smart enough to study science. What could you do with a degree in liberal arts? Become a teacher? A course of study in sciences included only a few liberal arts classes, usually in the sophomore year. This heavy emphasis on one field of study produced an imbalance in a student's education.

In recent months the argument has been made that including the humanities in the high school curriculum will teach the adolescents a more balanced view of themselves and the world, and help them to resist addiction to the cell phone. How could this be possible? Philosophy explains where each thing in this world has its place and contributes something to the existence of it all, no matter how small this contribution may be as seen by itself. Students can gain a measure of self-respect as they become willing to accept their responsibilities in this grand scheme. Other branches of the humanities also help to reestablish the balance in human life and education. Literature conjures up pictures in the mind's eye as colorful as any painting. In the museums of art, benches invite to contemplate any of the great masterpieces. Colors can elicit a wide range of feelings from exuberant excitement to tranquility and peace. They also speak to the tactile senses, producing sensations of soft velvet; smooth, cool silk; scruffy animal fur, for example. Music speaks through sound. What the message will be is left to the individual human brain. It becomes apparent that engaging in such activities also leads to contact with other human beings and thus socialization. What a pleasurable way of getting humanity back on a healthful track.

Father is a self-starter. He creates plans and sets them in motion. He is both a man of thought and a man of action—both dreamer and doer.



Social Responsibility Committee


Your Social Responsibility Committee continues to work on ways to help our Church become a little more "green." There are many easy ways to help make our church "cool," including turning off lights in unused rooms, avoiding over-heating or over-cooling rooms, improving waste through recycling, and encouraging congregants to walk or use mass transit when possible. Your church enjoyed sharing similar wisdom at the recent South Bay Earth Day Fair. We hope to encourage additional volunteers for next year's fair, especially to help set up and break down our booth. In addition, the Committee has proposed an updated church policy to request our vendors not to use styrofoam, as this material is not compostable. We are already using compostable cups for our Fellowship Hour and other events. As such cups are more expensive than styrofoam, we may ask for donations towards that cost.

Your Committee will also engage the congregation regarding the ONA process. To that end we are planning a Forum after church on September 22, 2019, where we will share personal stories of our fellow Christians who have experienced discrimination against themselves or their family members based on gender or sexual orientation. Other Forums and events will be announced in the future.

We are continuing to assist our neighbor church in Tijuana as it shelters migrants bound for the United States. Pastor Jose Altamirano from the Albergue Camino de Salvacion intends to be at the installation of Pastor Liz and may be available to discuss the progress his church has made in assisting those in dire need. To date we have helped provide the shelter with nearly \$6,000 in cash, in addition to socks, underwear and clothing. Most of these donations have come from other churches and individuals in the East and other SCNCUCC members. We will continue to ask our congregation to assist these impoverished migrants, as the need is great and will exist long-term.
