Happy fall season, friends! As I almost approach my one-year anniversary as your Senior Pastor, I find myself reflecting on what are the theological and biblical principles which have guided my ministry in general, and here at this church. As we move forward together, my desire is that we have an opportunity to get to know one another, better. It is in that context I wish to share some of my own guiding, biblical/ theological principles that ground me as a Christian, as a minister, and as a local church pastor.

- We are all made in the image of God (Genesis). God created us in God's image. That means we are all a part of God's good creation. That means we are meant to treat one another as beloved creations of God. Therefore, all of us deserve to be treated with respect, honor, kindness, and dignity, despite our differences in theology, class, politics, gender, and sexuality, race, or ethnicity.
- God is mystery. God is neither male nor female. God does not have a gender. No one can put God in their own "box" in any way. God's ways are not our ways. (Isaiah).
- God is Trinity. God, therefore, communicates and reaches us in a variety of ways. That God would want to be in communication and in relationship with us shows us God's love for us has no limits.
- We are only one part of God's good creation. (Genesis). God gave us the task to be good stewards of God's creation. As such, we must work towards climate control and sustainability so that animals, plants, and future human generations may be able to live and thrive in safe environments.
- As a Christian I believe that salvation comes through Jesus Christ. (The Gospels) God can reveal God's self through other religions. However, if I am going to claim to be a Christian that means the person I serve and believe to be my Savior, is Jesus Christ. That there are millions of other people who do not follow Jesus, does not mean that they are less loved by God.
- The Holy Spirit is God's power and presence in the world and in us. The Holy Spirit is alive and well and still gives us the power, ability/gifts, desire to worship and serve God. (Corinthians, Galatians)
- We are saved through grace and not through works. (Romans) We can't earn salvation by working hard or trying to be perfect in any way. It isn't about what we do. It is about what God did and does for us. We cannot, therefore, save ourselves.
- We are the Body of Christ. As such, we need one another. The body cannot fully function well without each part of the body working well and together. Jesus Christ is the head of the Body, and therefore we serve and worship Jesus Christ. (I Corinthians, Ephesians)
- God calls us to love others as we love God and ourselves. (Matthew; The Great Commandment) "You shall Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and your neighbor as yourself.) If I claim to love God, I must love others and I must love myself.



- As hard as it is, we must forgive others. (The Gospels, Romans and Ephesians) If God can forgive us (and God does, daily) then we must be willing to forgive others. It is a process and although we may not be able to be friends with someone who has hurt us, we must forgive them. We do so not only for them but for our own sake and well-being.
- There you have it! Please know I am always open to hear what your own guiding principles are that help ground you as a Christian. 
We will also have jewelry, baked goods and ornaments. Please bring your items to the church by the end of October. The money will go towards the Tower Party and other groups that our church supports.

Many years have passed since my friend Deb was an English teacher at a local high school. About a year ago, she learned that one of her previous students was speaking at the library about her recent book. Deb went to the event and after the presentation re-introduced herself to her student.

The young woman looked at her former teacher, and recognizing her, became visibly emotional. Tears moistened her eyes. She picked up her old high school annual laying on a nearby table and showed her what Deb had written so many years ago: “Sylvia! I want a signed copy of your first book.”

It was some months later that Deb was invited to Sylvia’s home for the launching of her second book. She was greeted at the door by an older couple who asked, “How do you know our daughter?”

Deb replied, “From high school.”

“You were in her class?”

“Well ... no ...” Deb said. “I was one of her teachers.”

Sylvia’s mother gave Deb a warm hug and said, “You are *the* teacher! You were the first person outside the family to believe in her talents as a writer. She owes her career to you.”

Words written in a high school annual changed a life. This story always makes me wonder: How many times have I failed to say an encouraging word?

I like to remember the words of Robby Novak. He’s the talented boy who created the Kid President character, appearing on TV in that role. Novak, born in 2004, has a bone disease. At school, this has made him a victim of bullying. He began his Kid President character because he realized that — because of his condition — he probably would not reach the minimum age to run for the highest office of the land. So he is working hard to make the world a better place in the time he has.

My friend Deb reminds me of what Novak once said: “Be somebody who makes everybody feel like somebody.”

JUST A THOUGHT

Yes, Liesl's parents, Herr and Frau Stadelmeyer, were convinced that they had found the most suitable husband for their daughter. Hans, the son of Herr and Frau Hellwig, was the best match any parents could wish for their daughter. He had returned from military service in WWI to help his father run the family business. Times looked very bleak after Germany had lost the war. Gone forever were the days of excellent, steady income from dealing with customers such as the Russian tsar, and the Indian maharajas who ordered gem-adorned trappings for their elephants. This changed situation called for a critical assessment of the few possibilities left. Hans and his father took a bold step. Manufacturing wedding rings might bring a steady income since young people were always getting married. After equipping their manufacturing place with the new machinery, they made a promising start.

The parents decided that now would be the right time for Hans and Liesl to become acquainted. Their meetings were all properly supervised. Soon, wedding plans would be started. The hope chest was ready for the bride. There were the "unmentionables" prettily finished with Belgian lace. On top of the necessities were two "parade cushions" with wide lace ruffles. As the name indicates, they were just for show and were placed on the bed every morning to make it look pretty for the day. But the wedding plans were interrupted by the unexpected death of Herr Hellwig. Two of his sons took over the business for their mother. Hans was in charge of the actual production, and Walter took care of the office. No doubt, the wedding plans would have to be put on hold until some later time. But Frau Hellwig told her son: Hans, you are 30 years old, it's time you got married and got out of my house."

The marriage placed Liesl into her traditional role of wife and mother, and she was determined to make the best job of it. She bought herself a cookbook to learn the more modern ways of preparing meals and fancy pastries. Soon she became the perfect hostess for family gatherings. All family members were very happy to celebrate the holidays at Hans and Liesl's home. After a few years, the first child, Herbert, was born. I followed four years later. The future looked good. There was only one thing that Liesl, my mother, missed. She would have welcomed it if her husband had discussed business with her, but my father was the old-fashioned type who believed that the wife's place was in the kitchen and in the nursery. He never imagined that there was an empty spot in my mother's heart, aching to be filled with words such as: "I love you; you are a good wife and mother; I am glad I met you." However, such very personal concerns would soon be overshadowed by the start of WWII in 1939.

Adolf Hitler, the chancellor of Germany, was determined to expand his country's borders into the surrounding European states. In his book "Mein Kampf," he insisted that the German people were entitled to more land for living space, the so-called Lebensraum. The targeted countries' resistance led to the war, and after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, the United States of America decided to enter the fight on the side of the Allies. Also in 1941, my brother, Herbert, was drafted into the army at age 18. Straight out of basic training, his unit was sent into Stalingrad. My parents never received any official notification of his fate. On February 23, 1945, 90% of our hometown was destroyed by a blanket bombing lasting 22 minutes. Our home had survived. But looking out over the firestorm that had been our city we could not imagine that we would ever have a life again.


