Scripture Reading: Philippians 3:17–4:1

Christ beside me, Christ before me, Christ behind me, Christ within me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me.—Saint Patrick

Today, on St. Patrick's Day, the whole world wants to be Irish! We wear green, we might go to a parade, we listen to the fife-and-drum corps, we hunt for shamrocks, we eat corned beef and cabbage and we might have a glass of green beer.

It's a bit odd that we do this on St. Patrick's Day in honor of a man who wasn't even Irish! Patrick's story, however, is a story of a young man who didn't hold a grudge, and was able to turn a bad situation into a stunning victory for the gospel!

As a youth, Patrick was kidnapped and taken to Ireland. There, he worked as a slave for more than six years. He learned the language and in time came to appreciate his captors. The Irish then were considered barbarians who lived beyond the borders of civilization.

When Patrick was able to return to Britain, he went to Rome, was consecrated as a priest, and eventually returned to the very land where he'd been a captive. Not only did Patrick spread the gospel of the Lord Jesus through his preaching, but through his life as well. He practiced what he preached. That's a good reminder for all of us.

JUST A THOUGHT Erika Dennis

Since the Storchenstrasse, the Stork Route, extends for several hundred miles from south to north Germany, tourists may wonder how to find the best place to observe the white storks. The name may bring to mind the Autobahn with cars and trucks whizzing by at high speed. But the Stork Route is quite different. After all, storks would not choose to settle amid noise, commotion and polluted air to raise their beautiful white chicks. The Route is a network of what used to be old country roads, narrow lanes and foot paths, connecting farmers' homes to fields, meadows, marshlands and rivers. This idyllic setting was the perfect mating place for the big birds. But change is inevitable. As the farmers began to use motorized equipment, the roads had to be rebuilt for the heavier vehicles. The lanes, too, may now have a smoother surface, but many of the foot paths leading down to brooks and rivers have survived to this day. Through all these changes, the white storks have continued to return to their nests each year.

Much greater changes occurred after WWII. With the assistance of the United States and the Marshall Plan, the European economy began to recover. This meant that more land was needed to build factories, and homes for the expanding population. The future looked bright. But this welcome prosperity also had a downside. Cities encroached on agricultural land. Farms were sold. Wetlands were laid dry. Voices were heard: "What will happen to our storks and their habitat?" Concerned citizens and governments began to make plans. In Germany, the UNESCO cooperated with the federal government to establish the UNESCO Biosphere Reserve Elbe River Landscape. This reserve protects the northern part of the Stork Route. It includes land on both sides of the Elbe river valley and extends for 286 miles through six federal states. The unique scenic route runs through more than 100 historic towns and villages. Bus tours provide many opportunities for observing the storks.

The vast expanse of mountain ranges, hills, valleys, wildflower meadows and rivers is not only a reserve for the white storks whose habitat includes marshes, swamps, grasslands, and riverbanks, where they find frogs, lizards, snakes and insects. The reserve is used as well for earth science and animal studies. It is an ideal combination of natural habitats and federal protection. Interaction between humans and animals is solely peripheral, the limits determined by the animals. This is also the setting for gaining more insights into the habits of the European white stork. Besides scientific data, it reveals a more personal side of the birds. As the story goes, a male stork, arriving first in Europe for the mating season, finds the nest which he and his mate had used the previous year. While waiting for his partner, a strange female approaches and tries to claim him and his nest. He is willing to make a change. But his true mate, arriving later, has a different idea. It seems that so-called nest fidelity is stronger than the bond with a mate. The European white storks are much easier to observe than most other animals. Their size alone would make it difficult to hide in open country. They are not afraid of living close to human settlements. For hundreds of years farmers have relied on them to keep frogs, lizards, snakes and insects under control on their land. This relationship allowed man to form a special bond with the storks. From that experience we could learn that most animals are in many respects similar to us. They have brains which they use for survival. With fine-tuned senses they assess other creatures' attitudes and feelings. They know the advantages of team work and community. In spite of their different shapes and sizes, they are God's creation just as we are, and they deserve our respect.

LENT: 40 days when we prepare for the sacred observances of Christ's death on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter. Many thanks to Mark Zimmerman for these notes on Lent. It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. We don't count Sundays as part of the 40 days because Sundays are like "little Easters" even during this solemn season. We focus on the cross of Christ, confess our sins, read scripture--Matthew 26 & 27, Mark 14-15, Luke 22-23, and John 18-19. That seems like a lot, but doable in six weeks.

Lent is derived from the Germanic root for "long" because Lent occurs in Spring as the days lengthen. The three disciplines we follow in Lent are Almsgiving, Abstinence and Fasting.

ALMSGIVING: Giving somethin extra to our church, to the poor, to charities, is a way to remember that Christ gave up everything to save us from sin and death, to free us to live a new life in him.

ABSTINENCE: Removing a particular bad habit, sinful indulgence or guilty pleasure from our daily routine frees us to engage in activities that please God and refect in a small way the self-sacrifice that Christ endured for us.

FASTING: Skipping a meal once a week or refraining from eating certain foods affords us the opportunity to spend more time feeding on the Word of God and being spiritually nourished through prayer and meditation.

Usually I give up candy or cookies, my two temptations. More on temptations from Fred Steiner in a children's sermon for Lent based on Matthew 4:1-2: "Good morning boys and girls. Do you now what temptation is? Imagine you have finished dinner, but you haven't had dessert yet. Your parents offer you a piece of fruit. (Hold up a piece of fruit and a candy bar.) You are tempted to have the candy, but the fruit is better for you. This candy temptation reminds me of Jesus in the wilderness for 40 days. He was tempted to turn away from God and woship Satan, but he did not do it. We have temptations too, don't we? Like—have you ever broken something at home and were tempted to not admit that you were the one who did it? Have you ever been tempted not to share your toys with a friend?

Have you ever been tempted to say something bad about someone just to get attention? Have you ever been tempted to play video games longer than you said you would? Temptations will always be with us. When we are tempted, think about Jesus. Think about doing what you know is the right thing, even if it is hard, even if you don't want to. It may be telling the truth when you don't want to. It may be helping pick up your toys when you'd rather keep playing. This week, and during Lent, think about things that tempt you.

Remember Jesus' temptation. Try to make the correct decision."

Mother Teresa offered a way to help us make the right decision: "Joy is one of the best safeguards against temptation. A joyful heart protects us from giving in because Jesus is there in our joy—He takes full possession of our soul when we surrender to him joyfully." and "Resist anything that leads to moodiness. Our prayer each day should be, 'Let the joy of the Lord be my strength.'" and "Joy comes to those who in a sense forget themselves and become totally aware of the other."

And "Joy is infectious. We will never know just how much good a simple smile can do. Be faithful in little things. Smile at one another." and "Let us keep the joy of loving Jesus in our hearts. And let us share that joy with everyone we meet. Passing on joy is natural. We have no reason for not being joyful, since Christ is with us. Christ is in our hearts. Christ is in all we meet. He is in the smile we give to others, and he is in the smile we receive from others."
